## Helping hands

The Helping Hands community group in Tullycarnet is the first beneficiary of the airport's Community Fund, which sees funds donated by the airport for flights arriving or departing between 9.30pm and 11.59pm.

The Airport in association with the Energy for Children Charitable Trust donated £4000 to the Helping Hands community group in Tullycarnet which has about 30 members and supports children who have special needs, suffering from Autism and Asperger's syndrome, both of which can cause communication and emotional problems.

As a result of the funding Helping Hands recently took special delivery of sensory integration equipment and toys. These materials will now play a key role in helping with the quality of social and personal interaction amongst the children who attend the group.

The airport is pleased to announce that the number of flight extensions granted in 2008 fell

by 28% from 2007, with a further decrease expected to be achieved again in 2009.

# Terminal Upgrade

## £6 million terminal upgrade begins at George Best Belfast City Airport

Not content with an award winning terminal, work on the privately funded project has already begun with the new external re-configuration of the drop off and collection area.

The new development will also include the relocation of the departure lounge to the first floor, whilst the retail, food and beverage offering airside will increase by a massive 60 per cent.

The new airside offering will include a Bushmills bar and a St George's market themed restaurant as the airport taps into the popularity of two of Northern Ireland's most popular visitor attractions.

Security search facilities will also be expanded to reduce waiting times and to provide a more comfortable and efficient transition for passengers.



The terminal upgrade is due for completion early 2010 and the airport will be taking the necessary steps to ensure the works do not affect the day to day operations of the airport.

**Service:**  
I began working for the airport in August 1994 as a Finance Clerk, became an Airside Standards Assistant in March 2003 and was promoted to Airside Standards Manager in January 2009.

**Duties:**  
The Airsides Standards team provides and implements airside operational policies and procedures to maintain a safe and healthy environment for all users. This is achieved through a series of functions, including bird hazard control, runway friction testing, auditing, de-icing during winter conditions, general aviation handling and stand planning.

**What does bird hazard control entail?**  
Bird hazard control is carried out on a daily basis, the aim being to achieve a bird-free airfield. We discourage birds from settling at the airfield by keeping

the grass at a length between 150-200mm. The longer grass means birds cannot get the all-round view from the ground which they need to see predators and therefore will feel unsafe.

**Highs and lows of the job:**  
There are plenty of highs – no two days are the same as I always face different challenges. Another major high is getting to meet celebrities, such as Bono, David Beckham and Lewis Hamilton. The only lows come when there is a prolonged period of bad weather which is not pleasant to work in.
